Judith E. Bendich states under penalty of perjury under the laws or the State of Washington:

- 1. I am the authorized representative for Appellant Friends of Ravenna-Cowen.
- 2. At the time the City filed its motion to dismiss, the City was still providing massive zip files of documents to the appellants in response to appellants' discovery requests, and no deposition testimony had been taken by any party. All parties worked together to schedule depositions. I contacted the City's attorney, Mr. Weber, and requested to take the depositions of Ms. Sarah Sodt and Mr. Nicolas Welch. At the City's request, based on the individuals' availability, the deposition of Ms. Sarah Sodt was set for May 10, 2018, at 9:00 am. Mr. Welch's deposition was set for May 10, 2018 at 1:00 pm. at the Seattle City Attorney's Office. I attended those depositions and took the deponents' testimony as scheduled.

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Preservation Program's web site made reference to a "windshield" survey, but no such documents were identified in discovery from the City; other surveys of Seattle historic resources were identified on the web site. Based on the statement on the web site, I went to the Historic Preservation Program office on the 4th floor of the Seattle City Hall. I reviewed documents that I was told pertained to the "windshield" survey, had copies and photos made of some of the documents, but I did have any context for them, thus, the request to schedule Ms. Sodt's deposition. True copies of some of those documents and a photo taken at the office are attached. 4. I attended and took Ms. Sodt's deposition on May 10, 2018, which lasted from

approximately 9:00 am until about noon. I asked the court reporter to provide me with an expedited copy of the deposition, and she said that she could have it available on Wednesday, May 16, 2018.

5. At 1:00 pm, I began taking the deposition of Mr. Nicolas Welch, a Planner at OPCD, who participated in the MHA EIS process. At some point during a break or after I had completed my questions, I asked Mr. Weber for a brief continuance so that I could submit evidence from the deposition testimony taken that day. Mr. Weber did not agree to a continuance.

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OFFER OF PROOF

The following offer of proof is submitted in support of the motion for a continuance based on

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Ms. Sodt's deposition testimony:

- 1. In 1998, Ms. Sarah Sodt received a B.A. in art history and architectural history and in 2002, she received an M.A. in Urban Planning, both degrees from the University of Washington.
- 2. In 2002 2004, Ms. Sodt worked for King County, Washington in the area of historic preservation. In the course of her employment, she did "windshield" surveys, driving, observing and then noting, whether any properties or structures were potential resources for historic preservation. The properties identified as potentially of historic significance were entered in the County's database.
- 3. In 2004, Ms. Sodt began employment with the City of Seattle at the Department of Neighborhoods, Historic Preservation Program, and currently she is the head of that program. The Program office is located on the 4th floor of the Seattle City Hall.
- 4. Predating Ms. Sodt's employment with the City, there had been a City-wide "windshield" survey of 34 neighborhoods in Seattle. This survey occurred from approximately 1978 1979. In a storage room/mini-conference room at the Historic Preservation Program office, there is a bookshelf. On the bookshelf (a photocopy of which is attached) are 34 large black noteboos containing the survey sheets for each property or structure in each of the 34 neighborhoods which is potentially a resource of historic significance. On the bookcase there is a file that contains 34 maps, each map identifying the area in each neighborhood where the survey took place. There is also a separate notebook that appears to be a summary of the surveys in the 34 binders. The pages in this notebook list by neighborhood and address the properties surveyed and include a column for a "Recommendation," such as "Landmark or "Comm. Sig.," meaning community significance. (The notebook cover and the first five pages in the notebook are attached hereto by way of example.) There are 89 pages in this notebook.

5. In approximately the year 2000, the Historic Preservation Program began to maintain a database. Included in this database are properties and structures in Seattle of historic significance and potential historic significance that have been surveyed from the year 2000 and after.

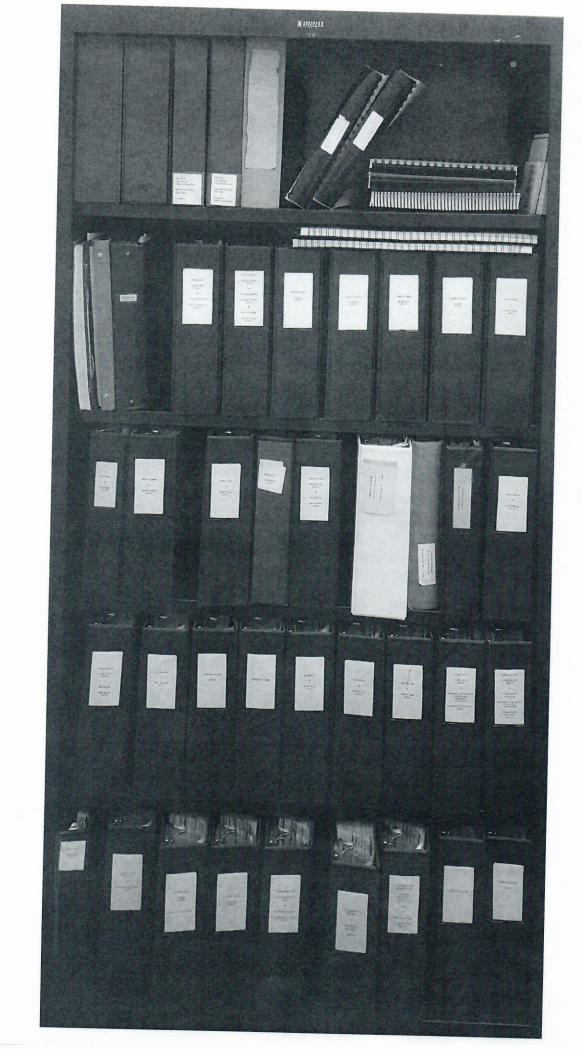
6. The information from the 1978-1979 "windshield" survey was never entered into the Historic Preservation Program's database. Although not in the database, the staff at the Historic Preservation continue to the present to utilize the information in the 34 notebooks.

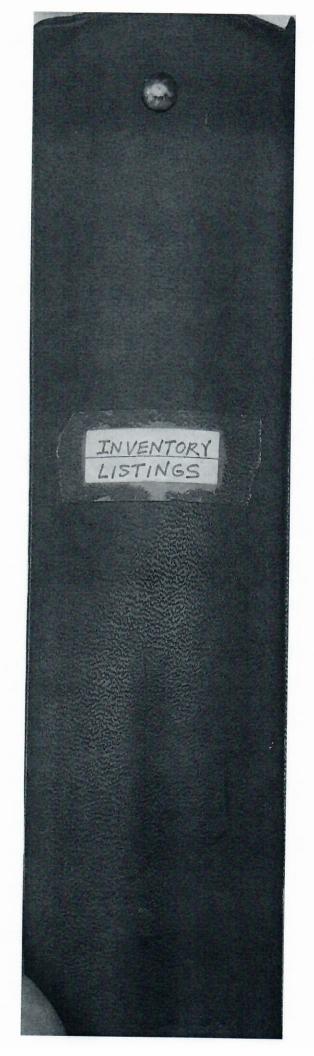
7. The City of Seattle retained consultants to work on the MHA EIS. At the beginning of the process, consultants assigned to Historic Resources (Section 3.5 of the MHA FEIS) met with Ms. Sodt to identify surveys, databases, and other materials that identified districts, properties and structures eligible or potentially eligible for inclusion in the National Historic Register, Washington State Historic Register and Seattle local registers. Ms. Sodt referred them to surveys of Seattle historic districts accessible on the Historic Preservation Program's website, eligible historic properties listed in the Program's database, and WISSARD database maintained by the State of Washington Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation.

8. Ms. Sodt did not tell the consultants about: the 1978 – 1979 "windshield" survey, the notebooks containing survey information in 34 Seattle neighborhoods, or other materials on the bookshelf at the Seattle Historic Preservation Program office.

INDIVIDUAL PROPERTIES are filed by address within each neighborhood. Numbered streets/avenues are filed numerically; named streets/avenues alphabetically. Properties with no address (such as parks) are filed alphabetically by name at the beginning of each neighborhood section.

COLOR TABS indicate category as follows:
